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DECORATING TIP  
*'Keep it simple – we painted the entire house in just one shade, so the rooms flow seamlessly together'*

**1 KITCHEN** Thyme for Kitchens (01483 203737) designed the cabinetry, and installed the stainless-steel Smeg (0870 990 9907) range cooker and hood. At the breakfast bar are stools bought from Heal's (020 7636 1666)  
**2 DINING AREA** A Habitat (0844 499 1111) dining suite sits comfortably in this huge open-plan space  
**3 & 4 SITTING ROOM** Carol made the coffee table by painting two wooden Ikea (0845 358 3364) laundry baskets and placing a piece of glass on top. SofaSofa (01495 244226) sells similar seating. Open to the bedroom above, the atrium lets in plenty of natural sunlight

**PREVIOUS HOMES** 'After emigrating from north London to South Africa, we built a house in Johannesburg,' says Martin. 'We then did the same

when we moved to this part of Surrey.'  
**CURRENT PROPERTY** Converted squash court in Surrey, built in 1920  
**ROOMS** Open-plan sitting/dining room/kitchen, garden room, utility room, cloakroom, two bedrooms, bathroom  
**PURCHASED** 1985

As soon as you turn down the pretty drive that leads to Martin and Carol Druce's Surrey home, you are aware of being somewhere special. Flanked by apple trees and a neat row of hedges, the path twists round until a converted squash court comes into view, with a façade reminiscent of the weatherboarded homes on America's east coast.  
 The property dates back to the 1920s, when the middle classes developed a passion for squash, and many country residents had purpose-built courts built in their grounds. This outbuilding came as part of a larger residence that the Druces bought in 1985. But as the main house needed a radical overhaul when the couple first arrived here, the squash court was left as it was.  
 Before long, the outhouse became a playground for the couple's children Nick and Sarah and their young friends. 'We had some amazing parties here,'

Nick remembers. For many years the family also used the building to hold charity fêtes and jumble sales. 'By the late 1990s, a tree had grown through the structure, so we knew that if we wanted to rescue the place, we had to do it soon,' says Martin.  
 Both Martin and Carol were keen to reuse as many materials as they could, partly to save money but also for aesthetic reasons. So they started with the roof, carefully removing its cladding of Welsh slate tiles. These were later put back, and any broken ones were substituted with near-identical examples from a reclamation yard.  
 As one of the benefits of the squash court was its impressive height, the couple took full advantage. 'When we decided to convert this place for domestic use, we opted to add a second level,' recalls Martin. 'Then, rather than split each floor into lots of small rooms, we kept them both open-plan. combined with multiple skylights, would give the place a bright, modern feel.'

The property's most spectacular feature, the glass atrium in the sitting room, also functions as an oversized coffee table in the bedroom above. 'When we put in the new floor upstairs, we wanted a glazed area left near the French windows,' says Martin. 'But this failed to meet planning requirements, so we decided on this table option instead, which has proved a great success.'

Once the building work was complete, the walls were lined with bead-and-butt MDF boards, which again lend a New England flavour to the property, and the entire space was painted in a neutral colour. 'With so much sunshine flooding into the house, we tried out lots of options before choosing this shade,' says Carol. 'We settled on a pale cream, which contrasts beautifully with both the kitchen units and the dark hardwood windows and doors.'

Carol then filled the house with a mix of pieces brought back from South Africa and some new upholstered furniture to create a cosy bolthole, which the couple's grown-up children use when they come to stay. 'We're absolutely thrilled with the result,' Carol enthuses. 'What set out purely as a way of getting rid of a decrepit eyesore at the end of the garden has resulted in this lovely building, which makes the perfect secluded retreat.' **BH**
